OUR VISION AND PURPOSE	ROLE CONTEXT	
 We believe children, young people and families should be safe, thriving and hopeful. Our Vision for 2022: Together we will courageously change lives and reimagine service systems. For over 140 years, Berry street has adapted to a changing world, and we will continue to adapt to achieve our purpose. 	CHange (Central Highlands Accommodation – nurture, grow, engage) is a pilot program (currently funded for 2years) which aims to divert homeless young people aged between 16-20yrs from recurring homelessness. This will be achieved by offering the young person crisis housing with a higher intensity of support that will be tailored to their individual requirements after a comprehensive needs assessment. This program will comprise of 4 x 2bedroom units which will accommodate up to 8 young people and provide an intensive support period of 3-6months.	
Berry Street will continue to be a strong and independent voice for the children, young people and families with whom we work. In collaboration with others, we will advocate for investment in early intervention and prevention services that enable families to be safe and stay together. We will use approaches that are culturally safe and informed by the best evidence available. We will measure and learn from the impact of our work, and we will continually contemporise our models of practice. We look forward to working with children, young people, families, carers, staff and partners to achieve this vision. Together.	Berry Street are looking to recruit a volunteer mentor 'Lead Tenant', for a live-in onsite role (own 2bedroom unit) that supports young people within the program. This is an exciting opportunity for an individual or couple looking for a rewarding experience, to give back to the community, gain experience and follow their passion of working with young people. The successful Lead Tenant(s) would live rent and utilities free . The Lead Tenant program offers young people the opportunity to live in a shared environment with a Lead Tenant(s) who provides role modelling of independent living concepts. Each young person is also supported by a Team Leader & Case Managers who provide support to both the young person and the Lead Tenant(s) with day to day support. The Lead Tenant(s) and the Case Manager introduces opportunities to the young person to further develop skills such as appropriately maintaining a shared household, learning to plan and prepare meals, budgeting for living expenses, prioritising health and safety, accessing independent travel options and engaging/maintaining education and/or employment.
