Explanation of Accreditation

Accreditation is a process undertaken by Catholic School Authorities that recognises competency to teach in a Catholic school and to teach Religion in a Catholic school.

There are two types of accreditation:


- 1. Accreditation to Teach in a Catholic School
- 2. Accreditation to Teach Religion in a Catholic School


All teachers are required to obtain Accreditation to Teach in a Catholic school.


Primary school teachers and Secondary school teachers that teach Religion are required to obtain and maintain Accreditation to Teach Religion in a Catholic school.







Accreditation to Teach Religion in a Catholic School (ATRICS)

Explanation of ATRICS

Accreditation to Teach Religion in a Catholic school requires knowledge in one or more of the following areas: Religion Studies, Christian Leadership, Theology, Scripture, Religious Education, Liturgy and Spirituality. The skills to plan, teach and assess student progress and achievement in Religion and facilitate student involvement in the faith life of the school are fundamental aspects of ATRICS.




